
Meltdown 95

For the last two years *Meltdown* has unleashed an outburst of the unexpected, the startling, witty and original on the South Bank. This year, Elvis Costello is in the driving seat, presenting his own brilliant and musically anarchic vision in the festival.

Costello's career has spanned more than two decades in which time he has recorded more than a dozen albums including *This Year's Model, Armed Forces, Get Happy,* Imperial Bedroom, King of America, Blood and Chocolate, Spike, Mighty Like A Rose and Brutal Youth. A genuine music addict who shows no respect for musical boundaries, Costello's interest in all genres of music seems unending, reflected in the other artists who have recorded many of his 300 or so songs, performers as diverse as Chet Baker, Johnny Cash, Roy Orbison and Blur.

'You may hear things you've never heard before and things you've heard before in an entirely different way. This year's Meltdown is a celebration of contemporaneous music. There will be music from near and far, from now and then, both entirely new and extremely old. Happening now.'



Deborah Harry, the legendary ex-Blondie star, and Elvis Costello join The Jazz Passengers for a spectacular launch to *Meltdown* 95. Drawing on the great tradition of the Art Ensemble of Chicago, Sun Ra's Arkestra, Louis Armstrong's Hot Five, Fats Waller and the Marx Brothers, The Jazz Passengers have forged a potent combination of music and comedy that has taken them from cult status at New York's Knitting Factory to stages worldwide.

Deborah Harry's career has consistently embodied the unique, the innovative and the unusual, exploiting her gift for live performance to the full and, in addition to an on-going solo career, she has appeared in such intriguing guises as performance artist, poet and actress. This will be the first time that Deborah has appeared on-stage in Europe with the Jazz Passengers and the first time ever that they have shared a stage with Elvis Costello.

Support comes from the young New Orleans marching band, Rebirth Brass Band, together with the mighty forces of percussion giants Afro Blok.



After a brief opening set by Costello, the first half is given over to a rare performance by the Fairfield Four. One of the most influential gospel singing groups to come out of the southern states of America in the last 100 years, the Fairfield Four were a veritable supergroup of the 1940s, and broadcast five days a week for ten years, sending their own brand of jubilee singing into virtually every home in the United States.

Part Two opens with a specially arranged collaboration between Elvis Costello and Bill Frisell (see also page 8), in arrangements and new co-written compositions. Costello is then joined by his colleague, Attractions keyboard-player Steve Nieve, for a set of piano songs new and old, including the first performance of their co-composition Lesson in Cruelty.

In the finale Costello and Nieve are joined by the Fairfield Four for a surprise collaboration hinted at in the title of the concert.

A young and dynamic quartet which has played together since its members' early childhood, The Brodsky Quartet has established itself as a top flight international ensemble with busy schedule of performance and recording world-wide. In the spirit of Meltdown 95, they venture into all areas of music new and old; they were, of course, collaborators with Costello on The Juliet Letters, the song sequence for string quartet and voice, and have recently been working with Björk on her forthcoming album.



They are unique in that they perform standing up – it gives them more freedom – and have even been known to dance on occasion.

Their programme includes music by several close associates of the quartet: Peter Sculthorpe and John Woolrich, who they first met at the Dartington Summer School, and Michael Thomas who is the quartet's first violinist. It also includes Shostakovich whose music they have performed on several critically acclaimed CDs.

Combined with a first half which showcases the hugely eclectic work of saxophonist John Harle, this is, in the truest sense of the word, a one-off event.
